### **Constitution and Bylaws**

As I noted in my first communique, I plan on highlighting various sections of the Constitution and Bylaws in my communiques. Some councils have contacted me in the past when a vacancy has come up during mid-term. The following section of the C & B deals with this issue:

### Part XI, Section 4: Vacancies at any level of the League.

(a) Resignations from office must be made in writing to the executive, submitted to the president.

- (b) In the event of a vacancy in the office of president, the president-elect shall complete the unexpired term of the president.
- (c) In the event of a vacancy in the office of president-elect, a vice-president shall perform the duties of the president-elect until the next election. She shall not be appointed to the office of president-elect nor assume the office of president.
- (d) In the event of a vacancy in any other office, a member shall be appointed to by the president in consultation with the executive and serve until the next election.

I do realize that not every council has a president-elect to step into the position of president, but it is so important to have a clear succession plan in place when you are electing your executive. The position of president-elect allows the next president to train for 2 years, then assume the position with confidence that they are ready to assume the reins of leadership. For those planning elections, please remember to encourage members to step forward. Past-presidents, I urge you to nurture and mentor our future leaders.

#### **Remembrance Day**

As we approach November 11<sup>th</sup>, let us never forget those brave men and women who fought for our freedom. Did you know that Remembrance Day was first observed in 1919 throughout the British Commonwealth and was originally called Armistice Day; it commemorated the armistice agreement that officially ended the First World War on Monday, November 11<sup>th</sup> at 11 am- on the 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the 11<sup>th</sup> month. From 1921- 1930, Armistice Day was held on the Monday of the week in which November 11<sup>th</sup> fell. In 1931, Allan Neill, MP for Comox-Alberni introduced a bill to observe the day only on November 11<sup>th</sup>. The bill passed and the name of the day was also changed to Remembrance Day. It has been observed as such since November 11<sup>th</sup>, 1931. Leading up to the day, poppies are worn to honour and support veterans. Many CWL councils lay a wreath at Royal Canadian Legion Cenotaph ceremonies. Let us never forget those who gave the ultimate sacrifice.
